Helen lived in remission of cancer for many years, controlled more or less by medication.

Sandy is an accomplished nurse (OAM for cancer prevention and Aboriginal women's health) and thus was able to nurse Helen, with Hospice assistance, which allowed her to die at home. Sandy also skilfully managed visitors during these final weeks, to limited time and numbers to protect Helen. She successfully carried out a difficult balancing act and has the gratitude of all the family.

Helen was the great-great granddaughter of Patrick and Mary Carrucan who immigrated from Ireland, arriving in Australia in 1857. She was a member of the Carrucan family history group and contributed to the family history book 'Dirt Poor, Spirit Rich.

Helen and Sandy visited Ireland a few years ago and were planning another trip, but her illness intervened.

She was a recorder and researcher of the history of sexual abuse in Victoria and a member of the Loud Fence movement. One of Helen's last public appearances was, to go to Government House for an event to recognise Loud Fences work in assisting survivors of sexual abuse.

Her funeral was streamed from Tobin's website and viewed nationally and internationally by family and friends.
